Building together for a brighter future

In the late 1960s, Zambia was the third largest copper producer in the world. Its natural resources made it potentially one of the richest countries in Africa. In the early 1980s, the world price of copper plummeted, plunging Zambia into debt.

Despite recent economic progress, Zambia remains one of the least developed nations in the world. Unemployment and poverty are widespread and two thirds of the population lives on less than US\$1 a day.

Decent housing in urban areas remains unattainable and unaffordable for most people and slums abound. Most struggle to afford the frequent necessary repairs to their mud, wattle and grass thatch roof homes. Cracked and broken walls invite rain and rodents into houses, which in turn pose serious health risks. Families are crowded into asingle room, which usually also serve as a kitchen. Children are exposed daily to life-threatening environments.

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Logistics

How to get there

Travel to Ndola: Lusaka airport and a 4-hour drive or fly directly to Ndola airport (Harry Mwanga Nkumbula airport)

Travel to Kabwe: Lusaka airport and a 2-hour drive.

Transportation

Habitat staff will make arrangements for transportation from the airport, and a representative from Habitat Zambia office will meet the team upon arrival. Depending on the size of the team and destination, transportation typically takes the form of a hired bus.

Lodging

Volunteers will be housed either in lodges, Bed & Breakfast or in a house in the Habitat community where the volunteers will be building. The accommodations can best be described as minimalist, but safe and clean. Volunteers will be sharing rooms.

Food and water

Meals in the community will be provided daily, including midmidafternoon morning and snacks. Mineral water will be provided throughtout the build.

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Meet a Habitat family

Ndombe Namasiku is a mother of four children. After her divorce, she moved to Kamanga community in Lusaka in search of a better life. She lived in rented quarters for 10 years until the local village headman offered her a piece of land.

Ndombe's old house was made of mud, plastic materials and pieces of iron sheets for roofing and with no floor and poor ventilation (the house had no windows). Ndombe feels very positive about organisations like HFH Zambia who help women in similar circumstances like hers and who can benefit from not only a secure and decent home but also from education trainings.

"My ultimate dream was to own a house with a toilet. So when I was informed that a 3-room house would be built for me, I was overjoyed and scared at the same time as I never imagined owning a decent house of my own."
