



Energy Efficiency for the Housing Sector


USAID and Habitat for Humanity Macedonia's Energy Efficiency for Housing project helps Macedonian households living in collective apartment buildings reduce their vulnerability to climate change and improve their capacity to measure and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

The ongoing USAID and HFH Macedonia project addresses the energy efficiency for the low-income housing sector through a set of activities that should help Macedonian households living in collective apartment buildings reduce their vulnerability to energy price increase, bearing on mind at the same time the climate change issues. Based on the assessment of

the challenges in the housing sector, including the ownership, management and maintenance of collective housing and the patterns of energy use and costs, project's baseline is that the energy consumption in Macedonia is high, unaffordable, environmentally degrading and inefficient. It takes in consideration the fact that the household energy consumption per unit of GDP in

Macedonia is 4 times higher than the average in the developed European countries.

In order to address this situation, the project develops four main objectives. Namely, it intends to (i) develop and test market-based solutions for energy efficient reconstruction in collective housing units, including financing models that combine capital and subsidies successfully tested and leveraged by project revolving loan fund, decrease that way energy consumption and cost for 20%, (ii) improve management of collective housing units in Macedonia through effective (self) management and maintenance by tenant (homeowner) associations, (iii) facilitate investment, entrepreneurship and "green" job creation, including ESCO quality energy services, and (iv) foster a broad-based societal platform that affirms energy efficient consumption of clean energy and advocates for efficient and targeted state involvement in the housing sector.
